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# The Architect Is In: A Brooklyn Townhouse Grows Around a Roof Garden by Christine Chang Hanway (/about/christine-hanway)

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

In need of architects to collaborate with her on the gut renovation of her family's Cobble Hill home, landscape designer Julie Farris hired Brooklyn firm Khanna Schultz, a member of the Remodelista Architect and Designer Directory (http://www.remodelista.com/architects-designers). Occupying the two upper floors of a Brooklyn townhouse, the project has a rooftop garden as its crowning glory. Vrinda Khanna and Robert Schultz, founding partners of Khanna Schultz



Longtime admirers of Farris's firm XS Space (http://xsspace.com/), Vrinda Khanna and Robert Schultz were delighted when she asked them to take on the renovation of the two floors, a total of 2,700 square feet. As one might suspect, the starting point was the elevated garden Farris was planning to build—and its location gave the architects an opportunity to "turn things upside down": "Placed on the top floor, the public living spaces became a natural extension of the rooftop landscape, while the private realm lives below on the second floor, which is the entry level into the apartment," says Khanna. "We developed our ideas for the top floor as Julie was designing the rooftop, and we began to see the interior as a landscape as well."

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
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
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


The Outermost House: Modest Modernism in Wellfleet

(/posts/hatch-cottagewellfleet-cape-codmodern-house-trust) Above: The clients wanted a contemporary, light-filled space that was as open as possible. On the top floor, the architects responded by visually lightening the structural stair wall by turning it into a floating art wall. They then removed all of the perpendicular walls because they weren't structural, allowing an unbroken vista from one end of the townhouse to the other. "Keeping the upper floor open from front to back without partitions was a critical early decision," Khanna says. "Even the stair is open and sculptural, bringing in light from above and allowing views to pass through."



Above: Situated at the back of the townhouse, the dining area is divided from the den by an oversized sliding barn door that, when open, allows the two rooms to flow into each other.



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
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Above: The kitchen occupies the middle zone of the interior landscape, between the dining area and the living area. Blown glass Pistil Pendants



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
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
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
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
Above: The kitchen cabinets were custom made by New Jersey Hardwoods (http://www.newjerseyhardwoods.com/home.html) (introduced to the architects by general contractor Showcase Construction), and are sprayed with an opaque catalyzed lacquer—a hardy finish. The island countertop is honed black Concordia, a type of schist stone (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Schist), and the perimeter countertops and backsplash are Olympian Danby marble.




Above: Throughout the project, the design employs a limited palette of materials, all of which were selected for their inherent beauty and texture. The same recycled wood used for the sliding barn door appears in the living area as a built-in bench (with storage) under the windows. Meanwhile, the Concordia hearth, which extends across the room on either side of the fireplace, harks back to the kitchen island countertop.




Above: Detailed as a floating object, the stair leads to the rooftop garden. The architects animated the stair wall by slotting a a bookshelf into it.





Above: The stairs between the second and third floors are more solid and built-in. In the private realm on the second floor, a sliding barn door closes off the rooms from visibility and noise. "The barn door slides with ease because of the heavy-duty hardware we selected," says Khanna.



Above: In the master bedroom, a minimalist and discrete slot diffuser houses the HVAC system.





Above: The architects detailed the cabinetry in the bathroom to be similar to the kitchen millwork. "We try to use a design language that continues throughout the various spaces, tying them together," says Khanna. "Our feeling is that this unifies the design and creates a tranquil space." The vanity top is made from Corian and the floors are green cleft slate.




Above: The apartment's entry vestibule is at street level.






Above: A view toward what is now the dining room. "The building was in poor condition and all the original details had been stripped," says Khanna. "This gave us the freedom to start over."

Hello Susan, as mentioned in the piece, the roof deck was designed by our client so unfortunately we are not able to answer your questions above. You can definitely get linear planters in a variety of materials including synthetics that look like metal but are light. Sorry we are not able to be of greater help.

Hi Melanie - thanks for the comment. The slate was sourced from Stone Source in Manhattan. It did require sealing but has been quite hardy once sealed. They also carry a nice line of porcelain tile called Studio by Atlas Concorde which we have used on another project that looks like slate or bluestone and is very durable being porcelain.

Hello Steve - balancing a clean, open look while still providing storage is definitely a challenge. Each of the bedrooms was provided with a good sized closet and built in shelving with the master having a generous walk-in. There are additional cabinets on each floor including a large coat closet at the entry that is not visible in the shot of the entry vestibule. There are several large scale shelves that act as both a design feature and a place where a lot of books and objects can be housed. The floor to ceiling bookshelves next to the open stair to the roof, the cubbies under the window at the living room and the floor to ceiling bookshelves in the family room (not visible in the photos but you can see this in the plan) all work this way.

The reclaimed wood on the barn doors is the same as what we used on the top of the long shelf under the windows in the living space. We thought this created an effective visual tie between the front and back of the space. Our client has since added a floating reclaimed wood mantle at the fireplace volume which looks great and continues that idea. Thanks for the nice comment!

Thanks so much - this is one of our favorite aspects of the townhouse. It is a corner house so gets light from three sides. The fact that there are few walls interrupting the space combined with the skylights allows this level to be filled with light. Many of the walls are pure white which enhaces reflectivity.

Thanks so much for the comment. The mirror is fixed but to its left in the photo, under the wall mounted light fixture, there is a built in medicine cabinet flush with the wall surface. There is one of these at either end of the vanity aligning with the top and bottom of the mirror.

Hi - We are remodeling our kitchen and considering Concordia or Absolute Black for the countertops. How durable is the Concordia? In certain light does it read more blue than black? Thank you!

Hello. The Concordia in the honed finish has generally been quite durable - you do have to be a little careful with oil and wipe up any spills before too long. If durability is your main concern, It is tough to beat the stain resistance of Absolute Black granite. If you don't mind being a little careful in terms of upkeep, the Concordia is aesthetically a lovely choice. It has a subtle linear veining that is really beautiful giving it a visual interest that the granite does not quite have. In terms of color, the Concordia definitely has a grey/blue cast to it as opposed to reading as straight black. Our client has found a cleaning product that works really well and their counter looks pretty impecable. If you decide to go this route and need the name of the

Beautiful project. I wondered whether you considered leaving the areas of exposed brick their natural color?

Thank you for your comment. In this case, we thought that the natural color of the brick would be too dominant in the space, but that the texture would be a good contrast to all the planar surfaces. On a practical level, exposed brick can shed grit unless it is painted or sealed.

Beautiful work. What are the size and type of downlights that you used throughout?

Thanks Jane. The recessed lights are manufactured by Contrast Lighting - they are adjustable so can be used as downlights or wallwashers. The overall diameter is 3-1/2" with a 2-5/8" aperture so the fixture is quite discrete. The bulb in this case is an MR16, The trim code is T3450D.
